

# **Fall Leaf Recycling and Seasonal Maintenance**

It's that time of year again, when the trees start to change colors and lose their leaves. Durham will be providing leaf dumpsters to help residents keep their yards and sidewalks tidy and clear of leaves. Durham residents may dispose of leaves from their property in a free dumpster available on

# November 12-13, November 19-20, and December 3-4 at Durham City Park.

The dumpsters are for **leaves and needles only**. Paper leaf disposal bags are ok but please do not put woody debris, branches, or plastic bags in the dumpsters.

Do not overfill the dumpsters or leave extras outside the dumpsters. When piles or bags of leaves are left outside the dumpster, the City has to pay to have someone clean them up and haul them away. If leaves are continually being left outside the dumpster, the City may not be able to provide this service in the future.



Leaf fall and seasonal rains combine to plug storm drains and cause

local flooding. To avoid plugged storm drains, **do not rake or blow leaves that fall on your yard or sidewalk into the street**. If you see a basin or storm drain near your home that is clogged, please rake the leaves away from that area. If a blockage can't be safely cleared and the roadway is flooding, call Clean Water Services at 503.681.3600.

As you are gathering up your leaves for disposal in the leaf dumpsters next month, please take a minute to see if any of



your trees or bushes are growing in front of or around a street sign or light, reducing its visibility. If you find that a branch or some leaves are covering the sign or light, please cut them back to ensure that they are visible, keeping Durham safe for residents and visitors.

Friends of Trees, a local nonprofit group, has installed thousands of trees and shrubs at Durham City Park over the years. The goal of the planting is to restore native plant communities at the park to enhance the health of Fanno

Creek and the Tualatin River. The new plants help improve fish and wildlife habitat, stream water quality, and community livability. This planting is part of the Tree For All campaign, which has planted over ten million native plants in the Tualatin River Watershed in the past decade!

Clean Water Services, Friends of Trees, thousands of volunteers, other non-profits, city partners, and private landowners will be working together again this season to continue the success of this program.

The next planting at Durham Park is **January 14, 2023.** Durham volunteers would be greatly appreciated! Please arrive around 8:45am to register and get your crew assignment and instructions. The event will start promptly at 9:00 am. Breakfast snacks and hot chocolate/coffee are provided, as well as gloves, tools and guidance. Please come dressed for the weather and wearing sturdy, closed-toe shoes.

## November is Native American Heritage Month

The City of Durham acknowledges and honors the Atfalati-Tualatin band of Kalapuyan people, who have cared for these lands and waters since time immemorial. Removed from their homelands in 1855, the Atfalati are now tribal members of the Grand Ronde and Siletz tribes, carrying on the culture and traditions of their ancestors. Durham celebrates the rich history and diverse cultures of Indigenous people by sharing artwork by contemporary Indigenous artists. From November 3th-6th, Heron Grove Park will host an exhibition that features artwork by contemporary Indigenous artists. Each piece

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## **Two Run for City Council**

Two candidates will be on the November 8, 2022 ballot for City Council. Durham registered voters will select two candidates for 4-year terms on the City Council beginning January 2023.

Residents have until October 18, 2022 to register to vote in November. Citizens can register to vote online on the Washington County Elections website. Voters should mail their ballots at least 5 days before the election or drop them off at the Ballot Box at the Tualatin Library until 8pm on November 8.

#### About City Council:

The City Council includes five councilors. Positions are nonpartisan. Councilors also serve on the City Budget Committee along with citizen appointees. Councilors elect a councilor to serve as mayor for one year at the January Council meeting.

## **Durham Tree Ordinance**

Trees are an asset to the community for both their aesthetic value and their ecological benefits. Like many cities in Oregon, Durham requires a permit to cut down trees on private property. The purpose of the Tree Ordinance is to preserve the wooded character of the City and to protect the environmental benefits trees provide. If you are considering removing trees on your property, you should review the City's regulations first.

**Do I need a permit?** If you plan to cut down a tree with a trunk diameter of 5 inches or greater, measured at 4.5 feet above the ground, you will need a Tree Removal Permit.

*How do I apply?* To apply for a permit, fill out and submit a complete application with photos of the proposed tree to be removed and pay the \$25 fee. Permit applications can be downloaded from our website or picked up at City Hall. Public Notices for tree removal

applications that will be heard at the Planning Commission meetings are posted on the website in the "News Updates" section.

What about hazardous trees or emergency situations? For trees that are obviously dead, diseased, or dangerous, removal permits may be approved administratively. A tree that presents an imminent danger should be immediately reported to the City. If a dangerous tree must be cut down to prevent loss of life or property outside the City's normal business hours, the property owner must report the tree removal to City Hall as soon as possible.

What are the penalties for illegally removing trees? The Planning Commission will impose a fine of up to \$720 per tree for trees removed without a permit.

What should I do if I think a tree is being removed illegally? If a property owner is removing a tree and you suspect that a permit was not issued, first check the list of approved tree permits on the City's website in the "Notice of Land Use Actions" section. All approved tree removals are posted there. If the property owner does not have a permit, call City Hall.

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# **Oregon Fire Evacuation Levels – Ready, Set, GO!**

#### Level 1 - Get Ready

Be aware of the danger that exists in your area. Monitor emergency services websites and local media outlets. You may be contacted via an emergency notification system. The Public Alert system and Emergency Notifications on your phone are very important! Level 1 is the time to prepare for possible evacuation:

- Make sure Go Bags are ready
- Review evacuation plans and options
- Charge portable electronics, hearing aids, medical equipment
- Make sure car has plenty of gas
- Move flammable items away from house

#### Level 2 - Get Set

This level indicates there is a significant danger to your area. Voluntarily relocate to a shelter or with family/friends outside of the affected area, or, if choosing to remain, be ready to evacuate at a moment's notice. This may be the only notice given. Emergency services cannot guarantee that they will be able to notify you if conditions rapidly get worse.

To get ready:

 Put Go Bags, medical equipment into car, back car into the driveway, and keep keys with you

- Locate pets and check on neighbors
- It's OK and wise to leave early roads will quickly become jammed
- When you leave, shut all windows & doors, turn off furnace/AC, Leave lights on.

#### Level 3 - GO! Leave Immediately!

Danger to your area is current or imminent, and you should evacuate immediately. Do not delay leaving to gather any belongings or make efforts to protect your home. If you choose to ignore this advisement, know that emergency services may not be available to assist you further.
