Prohibited items include:

Freon Appliances (fridges, freezers, air conditioners) * Hazardous Waste * Tires * Construction, Remodeling, Demolition Waste * TVs, Personal Computers, Electronics * Metal (larger than 3'x3') * Propane Bottles * Regular Garbage, Recycling, Yard Debris

Young Women Have a Chance to Explore a Career as a Firefighter

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue invites young women ages 16 to 22 to apply to participate in this summer's Portland Metro Fire Camp. This camp is an all-encompassing introduction to a rewarding profession. The camp is designed to instill confidence while building leadership and team skills.

Participants will learn what it takes to be a firefighter while completing hands-on training in hose and ladder skills, vehicle extrication, search and rescue, ropes and knots, live-fire operations, aerial ladder climbs, forcible entry, emergency medical skills, and other firefighting tasks.

They will also receive instruction from professional female firefighters from multiple agencies on how to prepare for interviews and gain insight on what it's like to have a career in the fire service as well as the importance of good nutrition and physical fitness.

This free fire camp will take place June 20, 21, and 22 at Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue's Training Center at 12400 SW Tonquin Road in Sherwood.



The application period opens March 3, and TVF&R will select as many as 50 participants. The deadline to apply for camp is May 12 at midnight. Space is limited. Applications and more information are available online at <u>www.portlandmetrofirecamp.com</u>.

TVF&R Seeks Volunteer for its Civil Service Commission

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue is seeking to fill one vacancy on its Civil Service Commission. The five-member commission oversees TVF&R's civil service system to ensure uniform standards in hiring, promotion, and tenure for employees. The commission meets quarterly to address a variety of matters, including oversight of actions related to employee classification, examinations, eligibility list management, appointments, and appeals.

An ideal volunteer candidate will have the following attributes:

- Is a resident in an area served by the District or owns property within the District's service area.
- An understanding of and commitment to the general purposes of the District's civil service rules, including providing equal opportunity to qualified persons in all aspects of employment in civil service positions and increasing effective-ness and efficiency in the administration of personnel processes.
- Ability to make high-quality decisions based on a mixture of analysis, wisdom, experience, and judgement.
- Is comfortable dealing with concepts and complexity.
- A broad perspective for viewing a situation.
- Ability to make a commitment to a four-year term as an unpaid volunteer, with attendance at quarterly evening meetings in Tigard and special meetings as needed.

Interviews for selected candidates will occur Monday, May 5. An orientation will be held in late May or early June with the first commission meeting set for June 11 at 3 PM.

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Make a Family Emergency Plan

Step 1: Put a plan together by discussing the questions below with your family, friends, or household.

- Who depends on you and who do you depend on?
- What are my evacuation routes (from home, work, school, etc.)? Know 2 routes home from frequented locations.
- Establish a meeting place away from your home in case of fire.
- What is my shelter-in-place plan? Have emergency provisions for 2 weeks such as water and non-perishable food.
- Do you have means to stay warm? Do you have a way to (safely) cook food?
- What important documents might you need to gather in an emergency? Put important medical, financial, and personal records together.

Step 2: Consider specific needs in your household.

• Do you have pets to consider? Medications or medical devices? Do you have caregivers to coordinate with? Tailor your plan and supplies; have a means to charge devices.

Step 3: Write down and share your Family Plan.

• Who needs to know your plan? Make sure to inform important contacts outside of your immediate household like family members living out-of-state, a trusted friend, or a neighbor. You may also need to share this information with those in your personal network who help care for children, family members with special needs, or pets.

Step 4: Practice makes perfect!

- Designate specific duties to your household members such as gathering supplies, shutting off utilities, preparing pets, etc.
- Make sure all family/household members participate and are comfortable with the established plan.
 Sign up for emergency alerts: <u>publicalerts.org</u>; <u>everbridge.com</u>; enable ShakeAlert[®] notifications by going to <u>uses.gov</u>.
